The Oral History Division

The Oral History Division of the Avraham Harman Institute of Contemporary Jewry (ICJ) began collecting oral histories for the purpose of historical research in 1959, aided by pioneering Hebrew University scholars such as Yehuda Bauer, Dov Levin and Haim Avni. These interviews, covering a wide range of subjects (Holocaust, Zionism and the State, and the Diaspora) and conducted according to the highest professional standards, have made the ICJ the foremost academic collection of oral documentation in Israel. Over the years the archive of the division has received similar collections from other prominent research centers and private libraries. Historians, social scientists, students, high school teachers and pupils, both in Israel and abroad, view the archive as a unique and valuable research and teaching tool. Our collection of more than 11,000 interviews in 20 languages constitutes a treasure of Jewish documentation whose importance cannot be overestimated.
